Investing in Caithness

Since 2008 RWE's operating wind farms have invested more than £3.5million into Caithness communities. The funds are driven by local people and provide valuable support for community projects as well as enabling local individuals to access education and training.

The construction of Camster II Wind Farm brings the total number of wind farms RWE operate in Caithness to four. In total they will make community funds worth over £580,000 available to Caithness communities each year. In addition RWE's Golticlay Wind Farm, currently in construction, will further increase this total to over £900,000 per year by 2027.

Renewable energy funds of this scale offer the opportunity for RWE to support both the communities closest to our wind farms and the wider Caithness area.

Listening to our local community neighbours

When designing our community funds, RWE is committed to working closely with the communities that live closest to our wind farms. Local community panels have been in the driving seat of deciding how our Caithness community funds have been allocated since their inception.

Throughout 2025 we've worked closely with these panels, listening to how they think this substantially increased funding opportunity should be used, and we're excited to now announce the next chapter in RWE's investment in Caithness communities.



Introducing Caithness Futures

As Camster II Wind Farm is now fully operational, RWE is delighted to launch its new Caithness Futures Community Fund, a fund to benefit the whole of Caithness. Designed in consultation with our existing community panel members, the new fund will complement the operational RWE community funds and increase their impact across the whole Caithness area.

Designed by local feedback

Workshop sessions enabled community members living close to our wind farms who are already involved in deciding how RWE’s operational funds are spent, to share their views on how future funding should be used.

Local Funds: Supporting communities nearest to the wind farms

RWE’s Bad á Cheò, Camster and Bilbster Wind Farms will continue to provide funding opportunities primarily for their closest communities: The Watten, Tannach & District, Halkirk District, and Latheron, Lybster and Clyth Community Councils areas. All decisions on funding will continue to be made by local community panels.



The Caithness Futures Fund

RWE’s Camster II Wind Farm will support a new fund open to individuals and groups across Caithness. The fund will support individuals to access education and training and a modest maternity grant, as well as providing funding for initiatives that benefit the whole of Caithness.

Several themes emerged that have been built into the plan for the new fund:

- A Caithness-wide fund to target gaps in existing funding provision.
- Themes that, at least initially, ensure competition for funds is reasonable. With universal themes such as health and wellbeing being early priorities.
- Fund designed to make the process as accessible as possible for applicants.
- Multiyear funding opportunities provided.
- Decisions made by panel members recruited based on skills and experience.
- Grant making focusing on opportunities for the funding to leave a legacy across Caithness.
- Open to collaboration and pooling funds with other funding sources.
- A commitment to provide an annual opportunity for both Caithness communities and other funders to come together to consider how things are working, best practise, consider what improvements could be made.

Who can apply to the Caithness Futures Fund?



Opportunities for individuals

In the first year £80,000 will be allocated to funding for individuals. Part of the new fund will continue the Caithness-wide Education and Training Fund initiated by RWE’s Camster Wind Farm Community Fund Panel. This will ensure individuals living within the wider Caithness area can continue to access up to £750 per annum towards education and training.

A further part of the new fund will be allocated to the establishment of Caithness Maternity Grants with the aim of reducing the financial burden of accessing maternity services. A grant of £250 will be offered to women in their third trimester, or before the baby reaches three months old to help with the cost of (for example) travel to Inverness, accommodation for themselves or other family members, childcare for older children or other concerns that an expectant mother may deal with.



Opportunities for Caithness-wide community projects

The remainder of the fund, £80,000 in its first year, will initially focus on health and wellbeing projects that benefit the wider Caithness area.

We will be inviting proposals of up to £20,000 for health & wellbeing projects that will deliver on the Caithness Area Place Plan, most likely on multi-year investments in local projects.

From 2027 the budget for fund allocation will increase significantly as funds from RWE’s Golticlay Wind Farm become available once that site is fully operational. The priorities for the fund will be kept under review as the funding available increases.



Get involved

All decisions on the allocation of funding will be made by a panel of community representatives. To ensure a joined-up funding approach, we will invite the Caithness Community Planning Partnership to nominate up to two representatives to join the panel.

Two places on the panel will be reserved for young people based in Caithness (under the age of 30). The remaining 5 places (including a Chair) will be allocated via an open application process. We are particularly interested in hearing from people who live, work or volunteer in Caithness that have skills and experience in community planning or projects, and those with an understanding of health care and health and wellbeing issues. Tell us what you think

In 2026 we will host our first annual summit on how community funding in Caithness, primarily from renewable energy projects, is being distributed and benefiting Caithness communities.

We will be approaching other renewable energy funding providers to invite them to be a part of this event and most importantly it will be open to everyone in the wider Caithness community with an interest in how these funds are spent. The event will be advertised extensively later this year.

Enabling individuals across Caithness to achieve their career ambitions



In 2025 RWE made a ‘Future Bright’ award to the panel of local community members that allocate the funding from Camster Wind Farm.

The award was in recognition of a groundbreaking decision they made to set aside some of their fund to ensure individuals across Caithness could access funding towards education and training.

So far £75,000 of funding from Camster wind farm has been used to support 78 individuals across Caithness, not just those living closest to our wind farms.

These awards have enabled people to access degree and masters courses in subjects ranging from law to Mechanical Engineering, Accountancy to Physics and Astronomy.

It’s also helped people into vocational training from dance to wildlife and conservation management, academic qualifications, from primary teaching to acrobatic teacher training.

This funding has enabled people to access work placements and contributed towards University accommodation and course fees. It’s invested in laptops that give access to remote, online study, as well as reducing the extent students need to work part time, allowing them to focus more attention on their studies. Due to the geographical remoteness of Caithness the funding has also enabled access, and off set travel costs, to reach specialist training.



“I, along with others on the panel, felt it was important to contribute to the Caithness Education and Training Fund because supporting opportunities across the whole county helps break down the geographical divides often associated with community benefit funds.

“This fund also helps bring our communities closer together. While community funds in the past have traditionally focused on the areas closest to the turbines, we believe adapting to the wider needs of the Caithness community reflects a more united, adaptable and forward-thinking approach.”

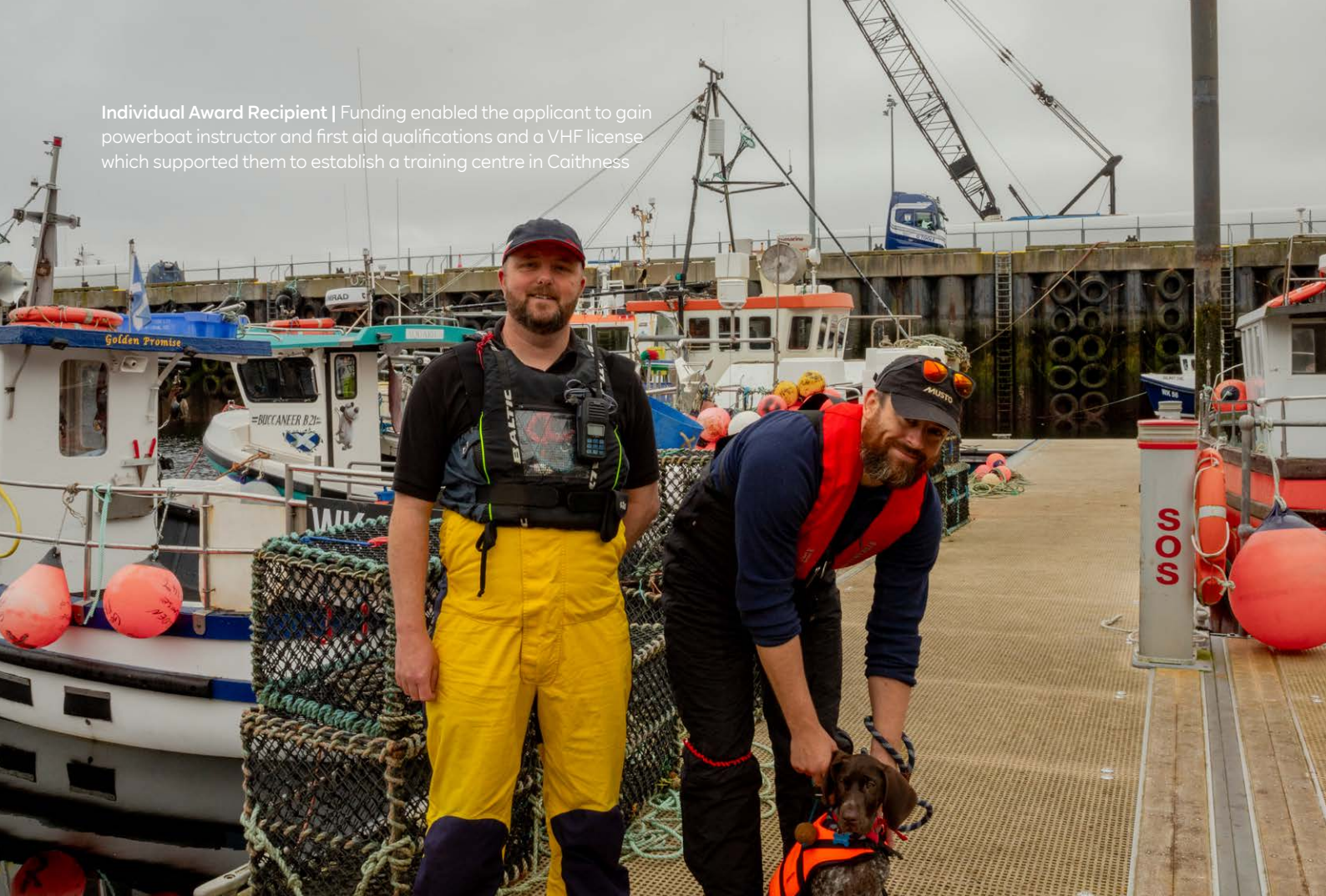
