Goole Fields 1 Wind Farm Community Fund AWARDS SUMMARY April 2016 - September 2017

Introduction

Goole Fields 1 Wind Farm is operated by innogy Renewables UK Ltd (innogy), one of Europe's leading energy companies. As part of the developments planning permission, granted in 2010, a commitment was made by the company to create a community fund.

The Goole Fields 1 Wind Farm Community Fund - established after the wind farm started exporting electricity in 2014 - received its first substantial donation (in 2015) of £64,000 per annum (index linked to inflation).

With the commissioning of the second, Goole 2, Wind Farm in late 2016, a new combined Goole Fields Wind Farm Community Fund will be established in late 2017 which will manage future donations arising from both Goole Fields 1 and Goole Fields 2 wind farms.

Therefore, the existing Goole Fields 1 Fund will cease operation in September 2017 and this report records the concluding work of the Goole 1 Fund covering the second full year of the Fund's operation (April 2016 to March 2017) and also includes the projects awarded funding from April 2017 to September 2017. This timetable is summarised in table below.

The Goole Fields 1 Fund

The Fund operated within a governance framework that was established when planning permission was granted. The Constitution set out the Fund's objectives, who could apply for funding and how decisions were made about the disbursement of the fund. The Fund was administered by East Riding of Yorkshire Council.

The Fund supported educational, environmental, energy efficiency and amenity initiatives or similar charitable purposes for the benefit of the public living within the Snaith, Airmyn, Rawcliffe and Marshland and Goole South Wards of the East Riding of Yorkshire (known as the 'Area of Benefit').

As stated, this report focuses on the concluding work of the Goole 1 Fund. Further detail on the establishment of the new Goole Fund is available separately.

The Fund Panel

Decisions about how the annual donation was spent were made by the Goole Fields 1 Wind Farm Community Fund Panel. The Panel was made up of nominated representatives who live, work or volunteer within the Area of Benefit and included an innogy member of staff (in an observers role). An Officer from East Riding Council attended all meetings as the Fund's administrator.

The Fund Panel held two grant decision making meetings in 2016 and two in 2017 (the last being in May 2017). During this time the Panel considered a total of 48 applications for funding and made 32 awards.

In accordance with the Fund's Constitution, the Panel held a Special meeting in May 2017 to consider the major changes that will accompany the establishment of the new Goole Fund. Panel members decided unanimously, and generously, to stand down (effective September 2017) allowing for a new Panel to be recruited for the new combined Goole Fund.

Fund Administration

The Panel was supported by the East Riding of Yorkshire Councils' Rural Policy and Partnership Team who provide the day to day administration of the fund. 10% of the annual donation was charged to cover this cost.

NB: When the Goole 1 Fund closes unspent monies sitting within this Fund will be transferred (in full) by the administrator to the new Goole Fund.

Decisions during the 2016/17 year

During April 2016 to March 2017 the Goole Field 1 Community Wind Farm Fund received 30 applications of which 18 were successful. Of these, 16 were taken forward and these are summarised opposite and overleaf.

In the period April 2017 to September 2017 the Panel received 18 applications of which 14 were successful. At time of going to press many of these awards are still "work in progress". Therefore these are more briefly identified in the table overleaf.



1 Business in Goole Goole Beach Day Grant Award £1,600

Business in Goole is a voluntary group of local business owners who work together to improve the offer of Goole Town Council to residents, visitors and investors.

This includes community activities one of which is the Goole Beach day organised in the town centre each year. This grant contributed towards the equipment used for the 2016 Beach Day.

2 Castaway Castaway Access Grant Award £3,866

Castaway is an organisation that seeks to improve the health and well being of disabled young people and adults with learning and physical disabilities. This is achieved through performance and leisure activities. The organisation has recently taken the lease of premises in Estcourt Street, Goole.

The aim of this project was to improve these premises for better community use by improved wheelchair access via a dropped kerb, the provision of new tables and chairs and some volunteer training.

3 Creykes Preschool IT Equipment/learning journeys Grant Award £1,354

The aim of this project, via improved IT, is to improve productivity of staff and freeing up time to be with children, plus using the equipment to provide learning opportunities for pre-school children and families. This was achieved by the purchase of new IT equipment and payment of broadband subscription.



4 Goole and District Community Transport Group Extending Opportunities Project – Phase 2 Grant Award £9,900

This award has enabled improved transport for residents in the Marshlands area and Old Goole through the provision of trips for families and elderly people and youth club transport.

5 Moorlands Community Charity IT Equipment Grant Award £10,974

This project has enabled the provision of up-to-date IT facilities for the Moorlands centre and, by doing so, has improved opportunities for the local residents in life skills, education, employment opportunities, social welfare and leisure activities.

6 Old Goole Gala Association Annual Gala 2016 Grant Award £2,600

This grant provided a contribution towards the Annual Gala for 2016 for the local community which is a three day event held in August on South Park in Old Goole.

7 Old Goole Senior Citizens Club Increase Club Membership through activity Grant Award £2,367

This award has improved facilities for club members by the purchase of thirty eight new chairs to replace worn out chairs that were both uncomfortable and, in some cases, potentially unsafe. Part of this award was also used to subsidize transport costs on several club trips in summer 2016.

8 Ousefleet Flower Show and Gala Annual Gala Grant Award £1,009

The aim of this grant to improve the facilities for this popular annual show and this was achieved by the purchase of a marquee and associated equipment.

9 Pollington Balne Preschool New Purpose Built Room Grant Award £5,000

The aim of this project was to provide improved facilities for the preschool children by the purchase of equipment that could be used in a new classroom.



10 Snaith and Cowick Drama Group Lighting desk and lighting upgrade Grant Award £2,417

This drama group produce two productions per year in various locations in the local community. This grant enabled the group to purchase a new lighting desk and upgrade the lighting and in consequence the group can perform in an increased number of locations.

11 Snaith Explorers Expedition equipment Grant Award £1,501

This project provided equipment and training for outdoor and camping expeditions that are undertaken regularly by the participants and leaders of the Explorer Group.

12 Swinefleet Village Hall Keeping the Hall Warm – Phase 2 Grant Award £1,870

This grant was awarded with the aim of improving the facilities at this local hall. This was achieved by the purchase and fitting of three new radiators that enables the new boiler to operate at the maximum energy efficiency according to which parts of the building are being used at a particular time.

13 The Conservation Volunteers Pond Dipping for All Grant Award £2,811

The aim of this project was to improve the facilities at the sugar mills pond near Rawcliffe. This was achieved by the installation of a pond dipping platform and disabled access to the area thereby increasing the number of people able to benefit from the facility.



14 The Green Team Ongoing Provision and Growth of Gardening Service Grant Award £10,000

The Green Team facilitate a volunteer supported gardening service to elderly and disabled residents living within a ten mile radius of Goole. The aim of this project is to expand the group's gardening services from 295 to 450 customers and from 27 to 40 volunteers.

This project enabled the employment of a driver to transport the volunteers to an increased number of locations.



15 Vale of Snaith Action Group Heritage Walks Phase 2 Grant Award £1,800

The Vale of Snaith Action Group is a local walkers group set up (with reference to Walkers are Welcome guidelines) to promote the local area.

This project refreshed 15 walk cards and walks signage previously installed by a funded project (2012).

This was achieved by volunteers re-surveying the walks, new artwork (walk cards) and new signage.

16 Yorkshire Waterways Museum Green Space Grant Award £3,000

The Sobriety Project uses the Yorkshire Waterways Museum as a resource for personal development and training for disadvantaged people in a deprived community.

The aim of this grant was to transform the grounds around the Yorkshire Waterways Museum into a sensory tranquil community green space with access for all. This was achieved by delivering a wide range of improvements and involving volunteering opportunities for disadvantaged young adults.
