CREW TRAINING – FACTS AND FIGURES

In 2016, weekly on-station training at sea and in the classroom formed the bulk of the training that our crew members undertook. This training was supported by visits from our mobile training instructors and specialist training courses at RNLI College in Poole, Dorset.

- Lifeboat press officer training

- Trainee Crew course (inshore lifeboat).
