William Robertson Homes Association (WRHA)

For over 60 years, William Robertson Homes Association (WRHA) has provided a lifeline to retired farmworkers who have dedicated their lives to the land.

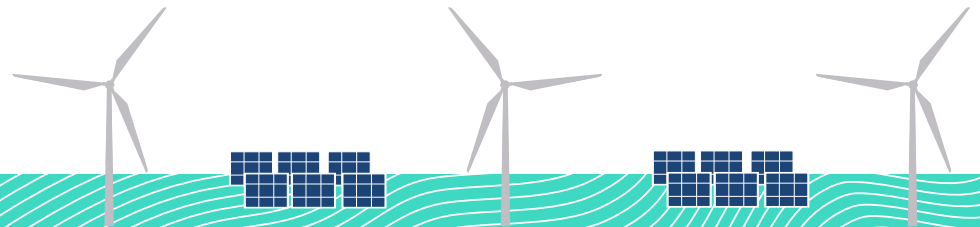
When their working years end, so does their right to stay in the estate properties they've called home for so many years. This could mean uncertainty at the most vulnerable stage of their lives.

That's where WRHA steps in with a unique solution to a very local challenge. Through multiple grants from the RWE Middlemoor Wind Farm Fund, they've been able to continue their vital work, providing subsidised housing where former

farmworkers can live securely and relax, surrounded by the countryside they know and love.

For residents who would otherwise have nowhere to go, WRHA's support is genuinely life changing. It's not just about four walls and a roof, it's about belonging. These homes give people the chance to remain connected to the farmland and nature that shaped their lives, in communities where they feel they truly belong.

The wind farm grants have funded essential upgrades that keep daily living comfortable, such as: new kitchens, efficient heating systems, and accessible bathrooms that restore independence.

Thorne Rugby Club

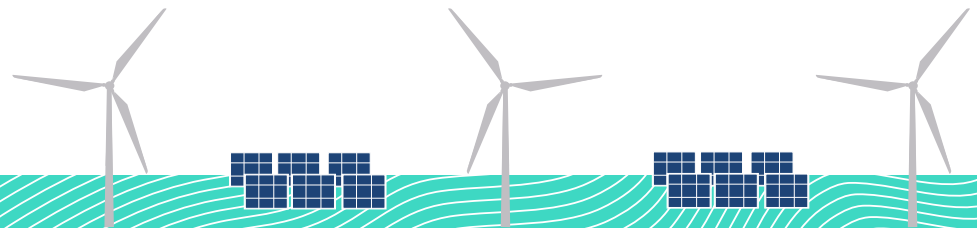
Thorne Rugby Club is a grassroots sports organisation where people of all ages and abilities can play rugby but what it offers the local community is so much more.

It's a community hub, a place where volunteers contribute, rugby players and fans of all generations connect, and families gather for other activities. Their motto, “One Club, One Family,” reflects their commitment to inclusivity and representing Thorne both on and off the pitch which is evident in their focus on championing the representation and opportunities for women and girls in the sport.

Maintaining quality facilities requires significant volunteer time and resources.

Funding from the RWE Tween Bridge Wind Farm Fund has enabled the club to purchase a new tractor for pitch maintenance. This ensures safe playing conditions while reducing the physical burden on volunteers, allowing them to focus their efforts on development and community programs.

Valuable volunteer time has now been channelled into expanding its community offerings. Thorne Rugby Club now hosts charity matches for local causes, runs rugby festivals for local schools, and provides free family events. The funding has been a real catalyst for strengthening community connections and creating opportunities that extend beyond rugby.

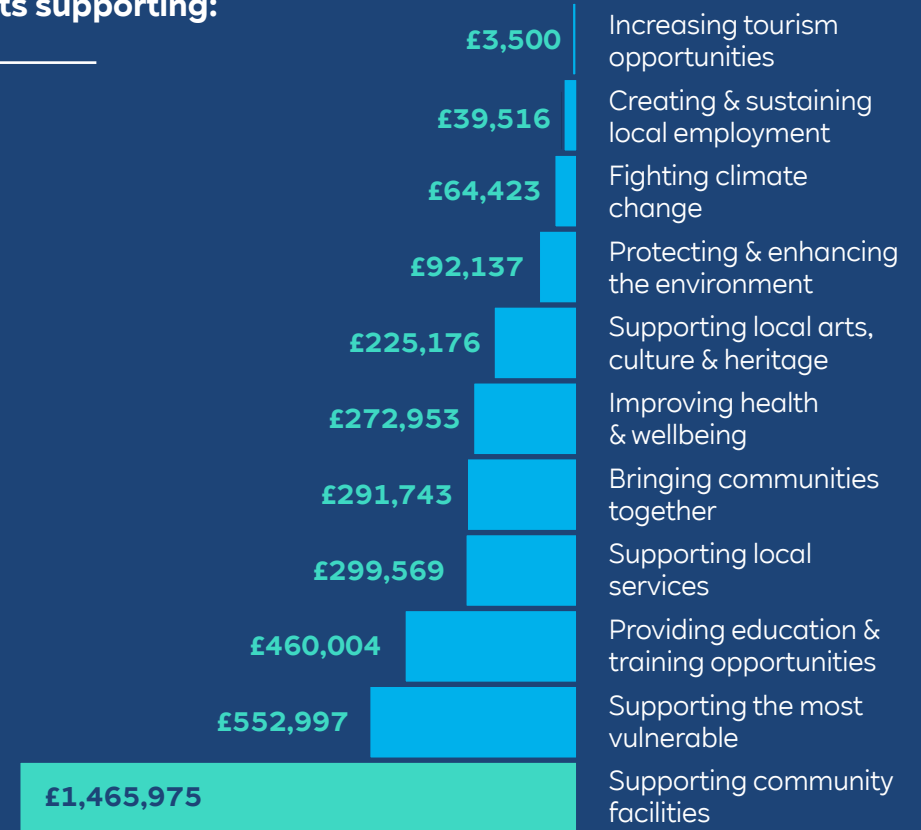
